(1) The compressed gas in a piston exerts force $F(x) = kx^{-\gamma}$ on the piston when the piston is at position x, where k and γ are constants. Suppose that when x = 1 meter this force is 24 Newtons, and when x = 4 this force is 3 Newtons. Determine the work done by the gas when it expands and pushes the piston from x = 1 to x = 9.

F(1)=24 } Therefore
$$k \cdot 1^{-3} = 24 \implies k = 24$$

F(4)=3) and $k \cdot 4^{-3} = 3 \implies 4^{-3} = \frac{3}{24} = \frac{1}{8}$
=> $\frac{\sqrt{3}}{3} = 3/2$.

So the work is

$$\int_{1}^{9} F(x) dx = \int_{1}^{9} 24x^{-3/2} dx$$

$$= \left[-48x^{-1/2} \right]_{1}^{9} = 48 \cdot \left(1^{-112} - 9^{-112} \right)$$

$$= 48 \cdot \left(1 - \frac{1}{3} \right)$$

$$= 32 \text{ J}$$

(2) The path of a particle is described by
$$\vec{r}(t) = (\cos(4t), \sin(4t), -3t)$$
.

- (a) Compute the velocity $\vec{v}(t)$ and acceleration $\vec{a}(t)$ of the particle.
- (b) Compute the speed of the particle at time t.
- (c) What angle is formed by the velocity vector and the unit vector $\hat{k} = (0, 0, 1)$ at time t?

a)
$$\nabla(t) = (-4\sin(4t), 4\cos(4t), -3)$$

 $a(t) = (-16\cos(4t), -16\sin(4t), 0)$

b) speed =
$$|\nabla(t)| = \sqrt{|6\sin^2(4t)| + |6\cos^2(4t)| + 9}$$

= $\sqrt{|16+9|}$


c)
$$|\nabla(t)| \cdot |\hat{k}| \cdot \cos\theta = \nabla(t) \cdot \hat{k}$$

= $-0 + 0 + (-3) = -3$.
 $|\nabla(t)| = 5$ and $|\hat{k}| = 1$

$$so cos0 = -3/5$$

$$so cos^{-1}(-\frac{3}{5})$$

(3) The polar equation $r = 3 + 2\cos\vartheta$ has the graph shown.



- (a) Find an equation in rectangular coordinates (x and y) for this curve.
- (b) Compute the area enclosed by this curve.

a)
$$r^2 = 3r + 2r \cos \theta$$

$$\sqrt{x^2+y^2} = 3\sqrt{x^2+y^2} + 2x$$

b)
$$\int_{0}^{2\pi} \frac{1}{2} (3+2\cos\theta)^{2} d\theta$$

$$= \int_{0}^{2\pi} \frac{1}{2} (9+12\cos\theta+4\cos^{2}\theta) d\theta$$

$$= \int_{0}^{2\pi} \frac{1}{2} (9+12\cos\theta+(2+2\cos^{2}\theta)) d\theta$$

$$= \int_{0}^{2\pi} \frac{1}{2} (11+12\cos\theta+2\cos^{2}\theta) d\theta$$

$$= \left[\frac{11}{2}\theta+6\sin\theta+\frac{1}{2}\sin^{2}\theta\right]_{0}^{2\pi}$$

$$= \left[\frac{11}{2}\theta+6\sin\theta+\frac{1}{2}\sin^{2}\theta\right]_{0}^{2\pi}$$

$$= \int_{0}^{\pi/4} \tan^{4}\theta d\theta$$

$$= \int_{0}^{\pi/4} (\sec^{2}\theta - 1) \cdot \tan^{2}\theta d\theta$$

$$= \left(\frac{1}{3} - 1 + \frac{\pi}{4}\right) - (0 - 0 + 0) = \left[\frac{\pi}{4} - \frac{2}{3}\right]_{0}^{\pi/4}$$
